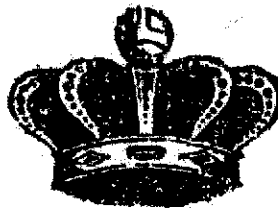

PREFACE

In an effort to establish a greater knowledge of the origin and creditability of CHECKER-Pool. I am setting aside a large section of this Book number eleven for history and pride. Checkers is a game which is enjoyed by everyone from tots to totters-oldsters ect. This is a game which calls upon the mind to function speedily and accurately. Few games of leisure have more colorful history or background.

This facinating game with a history trail as old as man has many good points to offer. Briefly it gives added enjoyment in consuming entertainment, increased social contact and communications aswell as mental gymnastics and above all is inexpensive in an inflationary world.

Some curious student perhaps, is desiring to just pause here on the challenging question... of Checkers extrordinary age, seniority, honor and dignity of which I am speaking. Yes, by the way, I will deal briefly with this historical and important part of the subject.

Early in this subject I wish to point out that Checkers (most Civilization) used the African

cradle So did man's first writings numerals-
themselves.--Arabic...So did mathematics,
Language and paper (writing equipment)
materials.

Indeed checkers is older than you surmised.
Checkers (draught) is man's oldest game.
Checker playing came with civilization out of
the earliest African Communities. According
to ancient writings in the buildings of Thebes
the African Kings utilized their leisure time
while constructing the majestic and magnificent
pyramids to conquer some associate prince or
companion at checker war. Homer made
reference to brilliant games of checkers as
played in the palace of Ulysses in Ithaca, in
his magnificent Odyssey.

Plato joins the Checkers news reporting busi-
ness frequently recalling Checker games in
his notes and writings. Throughout the il-
lumination and progress of the ages (mankind)
the "mind" game has retained its outstanding
nobility and unshakable position, being enjoyed
by the highest to the lowest mutually. The
great Africans originated, built (Stone Checker
boards) and maintained many checker products
and artistic monuments long before (2000 years)
the famous illumination of Europe and the un-
appreciated Civilizing, of Spain with art schools
and pool Checkers (with Moorish-Arab and
Jewish unity and Helpers).

If we glance back into the secrets, (deliberately hidden) of history we can quickly see that all the great roots of Checkers are originally rooted in Africa, (Egypt, Cairo, Timbuctu, Carthage and on, Ethiopia); with some Persian, Asia Cooperation-Ref: Nizama-Almulk studies with Omar Kayyam of Persia.

Recent historical trails of checkers-pool leads back to the European traders sitting in their coastal settlements awaiting the arrival and cooperation with African-Sailors-Traders-and simoultanously using their spare time playing native African Checker pool.

The great Sahara desert discouraged much fraternization of Europeans, but marine sailors etc, executed many types of cultural communications just the same.

Cartage, a Phonecian city established in what is now Tunisia about 950 B.C., speedily became a maritime power; her African sailors explored the know (much unknown-Brazil-South America) Civilization.

Hanno having reached Sierra Leone in 520 B.C., the Egyplians skirted the eastern coast and exchanged cultures, donating pool Checkers to India. In the 7th century A.D., the Africans (Moors under Muhammed) conquered the whole country between the Red Sea and

the Atlantic and dominated Spain. The people who had been Christian-European etc., were converted (saturated) to the new religion (so-called) and styles and arts, and even pool checkers.

These Arabs, being desert people were far more at home in these new areas than the Romans or Europeans had ever been; they sent caravans over the Sahara, their trades, customs religion and pool Checkers penetrating the entire continent. By the 14th century they were in touch with the Niger tribes and in 1591 Timbuktu was changed to Arab Moorish (or Mohammad Culture). These Victorious Africans established a series of trading posts on the east coast and leisurely indulged in pool Checkers and Chess. When the European traders arrived in these regions they found several of these post had become petty states and thriving with strong arts and Checkers.

Yes this period introduced the Europeans (whiteman) to the New Day, new trades, travels, cultures and Pool Checkers as they worked their way to the far east, the New World and Australia by way of the Cape of Good Hope. We see Marco Polos' account of Cipango- or Japan as a stimulus. These undertakings and activities were the conspicuous development of the great Renaissance (through Jews and Moors) which resulted in popularity

of Checkers and Chess along with new cultures arts, knowledge and even the Modern, discovery of North America.

The possession and traffic of Africans slaves was a custom, and novelty in many cases traders gave them to their monarchs or noblemen across the entire 80% continent of Europe as far away as Poland and Russia. The records show that the offspring of many of these Africans and their customs became substantial contributors to the complete cultural development of Europe. And as these Europeans emigrated to the Americas they brought with them these Negro possessions, African acquired (popularized games and pleasures) Checker games etc. for their leisure.

There are many curious legends connected with the story of checkers in Africa and India, but these will have to be related on some other occasion. Travelers, traders and ghetto slaves and Jews have brought the knowledge of checkers and chess to Persia (where the rules developed to nearly their present state). Throughout Egypt and ancient (dialectic-Masses) Israel. An inscription on the Temple of Thebes portrays the Egyptian King Rameses (1200 B.C.) engaged in a game of Checkers with one of his princes. When commercial (money warriors) ties developed between the Byzantine empire, Persia and the Africans

(Arab or Moors) countries the game became popular in Constantinople, the largest and most splendid European city of the middle ages.

During the African-Arab domination of Spain (700-1400) they brought with them their superior knowledge of Architecture, medicine, sciences and arts as well as other great skill in the mental games of Checkers and Chess and popularized them among the people. It has been said that the Jews and the Moors (Africans) made Spain a Chess and Checker playing country. Indeed a Jewish Rabbi, Aben Ezra who lived in Toledo (Spain), in the year 1100 A.D., has written a beautiful poem which in translation from Hebrew reads "Verses on the game of Chess". In his many writings in several languages, Aben Ezra mentions Checkers as a popular game among the Mediterranean masses. The Jews and Arabs (Moors), who did much in the architecture of our civilization, later became the hated target of the Spanish warriors inquisition (Catholic religious crusade).

This African (Moorish rule) era from 709 A.D., to 1400 A.D., conquered Mauritania, converted the people to Mohammedanism and saturated them with their great culture, art and skills-Checkers. In 711 A.D., their army crossed the strait of Gibraltar and began the conquest of the Iberian peninsula. They moved over the Pyrenees into France where they were

stopped (turned back) by Charles Martel in 732 A.D. These great people were an artistic, intellectual people who spread culture throughout all their lands and people. The major Spanish cities they built were Toledo, Cordaba, Seville and these were famous for their universities, scientific achievement and architecture and Checkers. While (85%0 almost the whole of Europe was sunk in the midnight of ignorance and barbarism. The dark (so called) ages, learning and the arts and luxury games (Checkers) skills flourished among the Africans (Moorish) and Jews in Spain where some remarkable monuments of their labors are still to be seen.

About the 12th century A.D., the Spanish Christians began their reconquest of the Moors (Mostlems). After 300 years (till 1492) of bitter fighting the Arabs occupancy of Spain came to an end with the fall of Granada. The expulsion of the Moors and Jews in Castile followed in 1502. The terrible persecution and final expulsion of the Moors and Jews, subsequent decline of Spain. For these Arabian, Africans and Jews were ingenious and industrious citizens. After their departure agriculture, trade, and skills fell into decay. Both the Jews and Moorish population were persecuted severely, and practically exterminated by the Victorious Spanish religious (so-called Christians) fanatics, Catholic rulers.

NEW ERA (REINESANCE)

Upon the defeat, captivity, enslavement and extermination of the Moors (Africans) civilization by the Spanish military (christian crusaders), we find that slaves and survivors (Blacks) were traded, given away, and sold to every nation and every part of the world. Thus the habits, games (Checkers) and many points of their black culture traveled many directions. Through the east, to India, the Mediteranean the Byzontine empire, all of Europe, and as far as Russia and the New World America.

The successful Spainard Chistopher Columbus carried Checkerboards and (Spanish) pool Checkers skills with him on his voyage to America, in 1492. The sailors-Blacks and Spanish spent many quite nights playing pool Checkers - (Spanish - African) style games. Hervan Cortez whose military invaded Mexico used much leisure in strange Newland playing pool checkers.

Miguel Cervantes says pool Checkers was popular in Quixate. The Spaniards-(Moorish; Students) played checker pool as we play it today. Similar rules and styles, 95%. It is important to point here and now that Etheopia (or Africa) covered or contained several countries that historical divisionist claim to be

separated countries. The Etheopia referred to in the Bible was not limited to the geographical confines of the modern Etheopia, but included the vast reaches of that country we know today as the Sudan and other neighboring lands.

The late William Leo Hansberry wrote, "In Homeric and early Hellenic times the name Etheopia was also applied to extensive regions in western and southern Asia, notably southwestern Arabia, southern Persia, and India - which were then occupied primarily or substantially by people whose skin was dark brown, or mostly black. In other words, the term 'Aethiopia' or 'Ethiopia' was used in earlier times in a much more inclusive sense than at the present day. "(Ancient Kush, old-Aethiopia, and the Baland Es Sudan, P.1) Reference.".. It is ironic that a descendent of Ethiopia Culture which first moved north ward to Egypt on to north Africa and later to America (north and south) built some of the worlds first cities and his present day American-Negro descendants are now confined-hyphynated or locked down in the ghettos of many twentieth century cities (checker status) separatism....Dr. King's great work hit this present day Ghetto Blacks Status hard and helpfully, we are today amazed by the dazzling contributions of this Black Civilization. The worlds culture is deeply indebted to the Ethiopians, Egyptians, Arabs and Moors, and their great advances in architecture,

medicine, astronomy art, games-Checkers, military technique and agricultures.

1500 years before Christ the children of the Sidonians, were skilled workers in silver and brass. When Solomon began work on his monumental Temple, he sought craftsmen from Hiram...King of Tyre. King Solomon said "Thou knowest that there is not among us that can skill to hew timber like unto the Sidonians (Kings 5:6.) Black Africans.

These people of Tyre were known as Pheenicians. As hardy seagoing folk they braved the seas (worldwide) even to South America. Thus transporting pool checkers, arts and much black culture. They sailed the Mediterranean, the Indian sea, even completely around Africa and entered Brazil of South America. According to time magazine May 24, 1968, Joaquin Alvis De Costa found a precious stone inscription on a broken stone tablet on his sprawling estate in the tropical rain forest of Brazils Paraiba State" A copy of this wonder tablet was translated (interpeted) by Ladislau Netto, director of the national Museum as being a Phoenician (Africa) engraving. Professor Cyrus A. Gordon of Brandeis University an expert in Semitie languages says the wonderful inscription is in good 100%, Phoenicia writing of 1000 years B.C., and reads as follows "We are the sons

of Canon from Sidon the city of the King, Commerce has cast us on this distant shore a land of mountains. The tablet tells of the Phoenician ship that sailed from the ancient port of Ezion-Geber near Israeli on the Gulf of Agoba.

Experts presume they sailed through the Red Sea rounded the tip of Africa and were driven into the South Equatorial current by a storm. Thereby swept across the Atlantic to the coast country of Brazil, and these historic African voyagers left their memoirs. Many years have passed since these Black nations sat astride Asia Minor, north Africa and even Spain-leaving historical records, monuments and games (pool Checkers) and culture that seem incredible.

The great George Rawlinson says "Suffice it to observe that though possessed with many natural advantages the African (Chaldean Ethiopians and Moors etc.) exhibited a fertility of invention, a genius and an energy which place them high in the scale of nations and more especially in the list of those descended from a Hamitic stock. For the last 3000 years the world has been mainly indebted for its advancement to the Semitic and Indo-European races; but it was other wise in the first ages, Ethiopia, Egypt all of Africa led the way, and acted as pioneers of mankind

(Civilization) in various untrodden fields of art, Music, literature, "games" (Checkers) and science. Alphabetic writing, Astronomy, history, chronology, architecture, plastic art, sculpture, navigation, agriculture, textile-industry seem all of them to have had their origin (cradle) in one or other of the African countries. (Seven great Monarchs Vol I, pp. 40, 44 references.)

African artwork of carvings and sculptures of wood, stone and ivory displayed originality in technique and subject matter. It is clear from these works that Africans had an abundant capacity for aesthetic expression. There were considerable works in gold, silver and clay from Timbuktu to the Congo. Music in Africa. The songs-games were most frequently used for recreational, social, religious or ritualistic purposes, and often sung without instruments, including violins, guitars, harps and flutes. When the white man visited Africa he did not find a simple culture and way of life. The life style was complex with a division of labor and specialization in occupations. Basic social existence was solved and strong economy and political form in plain view (stratification magnificence).

"AFRICA NOW"

There have been many questions (debates) concerning the retaining of African culture by American Negroes. Some have falsely (ignorantly) suggested that nothing existed in Africa that approached civilization and there was nothing for Blacks to bring with them. Their argument and evidence presented is sick and most untrue and not tenable historically. Of course African cultural-heritage can be beautifully observed in many (millions) aspects of African (Negro) life today. This is seen in the form of languages, cultural styling, shriners, pool checkers and chess ect.

Thus in the earliest human cradles when men formed nations, Blackmen stood strong and prepared to make immortal contributions to civilization and progress.

Although there has been much effort to hide and ignore African history and contributions of specifically Blackmen; Biblical and ancient history, findings of archeologist and anthropologists have preserved the records of Blackmen in every field of endeavor.

The works of Black men in earliest Egypt were important. I frankly feel that civilization came north from Black Ethiopia.

Diodorus Siculus the great Greek historian shows that most of the customs, beliefs and practices of the early Egyptians in regard to their kings, the manner of burying their dead the shape of their statues and the forms of letters were obtained from the Black Ethiopians who lived along the Nile and were black, had flat noses and kinky hair. This description surely identifies the physical qualities that scientist and history ascribe to Negroes (or Blacks). Recent and authentic discoveries in Africa show that (By monuments) the Black people (Ethiopians) played a very major role-part in the first stages of the worlds history.

These many records with a great number of monuments of great antiquity (even checker boards-games) demonstrate without the shadow of a doubt that the African (ethiopian) civilization (Blackmen) was older than the most ancient history of Egypt, going back many many centuries before Moses. It even appears that Black nations of Africa (certain regions) were not infants but descendants of powerful civilizations broken up by the earliest Ethiopians who preceded the Egyptians by many centuries.

Exploration was another field of action for Blacks. In this area the name of Estanvanico is known as the Black guide of Menduzo the Spanish conquistador. This Black man served in this position until his death. These magnificent facts write the Musical introduction of (world's wisest) King Soloman's great Song. Song of Solomon which reads in the King James Bible "I am black but comely". In the Septuagint version (Translation): "I am black but beautiful". Perhaps the modern rallying slogan of American Negroes was conceived (Black is Beautiful) here for Black pride and love in that long ago in Song of Solomon. Now and then a student comes forth and attempts to open the minds of people in the black race to great possibilities presently before them because they are descendants of a race and culture ...worthy of honor among the greatest people of the world. Few know anything about the origin of the Black man (pool Checkers) "of the United State", from which Fredrick Douglas, Booker T. Washington, DR. George Washington Carver, Dr. W.E.B. Dubois, Paul Robinson, Langston Hughes and Dr. Martin Luther King all cameforth as uncrowned Kings and certainly deserving the presidency (at least one of them) or vice presidency of the United States.

Yes the evidence shows that while the Anglo-Saxons, Celts, Scandinavians and Germans (European-Whites) wore skins devoured their food raw, lived in caves, and were happily

busy cutting each others throats over dry bones while the great ancestors of the American Blacks (Negroes) of the United States were enjoying the highest arts, games (pool Checkers-Chess) and culture and lived in palaces and erected magnificent architecture and behaved like civilized people (and yes played and enjoyed pool-Checkers abundantly).

The Black man's problems are not something which concerns one man or race. Every American, whether he realizes it or not is deeply involved. The sadness of ignorance cost a lot when the majority, who are able to know so much understand the Black man...so little.

Today's race struggle didn't begin with American civilrights activity. It began centuries ago when the Africans suddenly found the white man chasing him and running him down (Dog catcher style) for slavery and captivity. The white man had not come to help them. He came to imprison them. He captured their strongest people, tied them together and marched them to the coasts. Only a small percentage survived the forced-cruel marches to the coasts and ocean voyages. Most of those who did were bought by plantation owners (Islands in Brazil or the United States. Slave plunder and trade (brutality) was not effectively brought under control until the beginning of the twentieth century about seventy years ago-By that time the the population of Africa had been reduced

eighty million. These early traders amassed fortunes (personal) but they left behind them depleted tribes, burned out villages, devastated fields, murdered mutilated bodies and a terrible memory of hatred for the white man. Still, another robbery chapter had to be written... that of the more sophisticated exploitation and oppression of the colonials period endured by the remaining African people...In Africa and of Africa.

The first slaves (pool checker players) came to the western hemisphere from Spain (pool checker - Moors - capital - center of world) being the (recently) defeated property (By Catholic religious war) of the Spanish slave holders. This was about the year 1497. A few years after Columbus sailed to America (so called discovery of America) King Ferdinand of Spain sent slaves (Black-games-cultures-pool Checkers) to Hispaniola. Again he sent some in 1510. Traffic in slaves-(pool checkers players) was established between Guinea and Hispaniola and when Balboa planted his flag on the Pacific coast he is said to have had with him thirty Negroes who helped him build the first ship constructed on a coast of America. Later Charles V . King (C. King of..Spain-smile) of Spain, who was also Emperor of Germany and the Netherlands granted the Flemish Noblemen the right to import many thousand negroes or Africans (pool checker gamblers) to Hispaniola, Cuba Jamaica and other sea ports ("Now" and then pool checker centers enthusiasts). Smile.

In 1522 three hundred slaves (pool checker players) accompanied Cortez in his conquest of Mexico (Where pool checker still thrives). It is known that African-Negro slaves founded the town of Santiago del Príncipe after they rebelled against their Spanish masters, and are still playing pool checkers well. A number were also with Vasques de Allyon, when an attempt was made to establish a settlement on the coast of the now North and South Carolinas. It is also certain that a great number of negro slaves (pool checkerists) were in the expedition of De Narvaez in his Florida conquest. The expedition failed and many members died. The survivors were captured by the Indians but one of them, a slave named Esten Vancia, with a couple of companions wandered over Texas and New Mexico for years. He later led an expedition from Mexico and discovered what is now Arizona and New Mexico, and was killed in New Mexico.

In the expedition of Desoto were many Negro slaves. Many Negro slaves accompanied other expeditions of the Spaniards; but great importance of slaves from Africa to America is also credited to the English. Who eventually abandoned it and outlawed it in 1811. It is a matter of historical fact that Pedro Menendez Alives had a large number of Black Negro slaves (pool checker - still toughies) when he founded St. Augustine Florida; that they were brought from Spain (African - Moorish pool checker

center) and that they were trained in mechanical (beneficial) pursuits Skills, and in tilling of the soil. The first African slaves to enter negro (Freedom) Citizenship in the United States were landed at Jamestown Virginia in 1619 from a dutch vessel. There were twenty slaves and the ship master exchanged them for provisions or needed ship supplies.

It has taken America four hundred years to reach a partial decision that such Black men and women as were on the slave boats were really human beings, (Humanitarian truths), and the few of many thousand (Freedom-citizenship Fighters) who perhaps more than any other individuals in the history of the country who brought about the realization and progress in its fullest sense were #1. A descendant of those early slaves: Fredrick Douglas #2. Also descendents of slaves. (Booker T. Washington) were born near and educated with in sight of the spot where that first slave vessel made its historic landing. And #3. Last but not least our Modern Moses; Martin Luther King of Atlanta Georgia... (The heart beat of slavery and cruelty).

The great Baptist preacher..Dr. King organized the Southern Christian Leadership Conference to press the intergration (Freedom) cause who himself had gone to jail 17 times despite his insistance on a Ghadi style of non-violence, deplored the down trodden Ghetto

men Ghetto rights, "we are moving to the land of freedom"...Yes certainly many things were changing many hardships were disappearing and more improvements would come. But much Social Smog and clouds lingered. The Preacher "Beloved Martin Luther King" who had won the Nobel Peace Prize for his humanity (Reconciling) works, said that he had been to the mountain top and looked over into the promised land...but doubted if he himself would get there, (Foreknowing) but, he said the people would get there. Next day on Apr.4, 1968, he was shot down at the age of 39 in the city of Memphis.

"For no real cause they despised (Him) "Jesus". John 15:25. "They hated me without a cause. Scriptures says..For doing good, they plotted destruction-murder against Him. Matt. 12:13-14. "For healing a man they went out and held a council against him, how they might destroy him...Also in similar manner Jesus also forecast the cloudy-cruelty of hate and crucification with a ultimate victory and overcoming by his followers. And break their binding chains and blot out this awful sin.

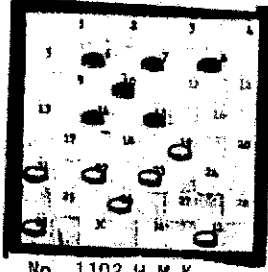
